Eastside turns the tide, 27-24

Felton Woulard returns a kickoff 82 vards with less than 30 seconds left to lift the Rams over the GHS Hurricanes.

It's funny, in an odd but not amusing way, how the directions of two football teams can change in a short period of

Entering the week, Gainesville High School was 3-0 and rolling into a contest with rival Eastside, which had stumbled to an 0-3 start. The Rams had scored 13 points all year, and consistently hurt themselves with mental errors and dropped passes.

A couple of days ago, the Hurricanes' fortunes began to sink when the Florida High School Activities Association wiped away victories against P.K. Yonge and Santa Fe for a rules violation. Eastside, meanwhile, found itself down three with 27.7 seconds remaining Friday night at Citizens Field and appeared headed for another letdown.

Then, Felton Woulard may have rescued the Rams' season.

Snuck in on the kickoff return team after GHS's Danny Jacobs booted a tiebreaking 18-yard field goal, the senior quarterback picked up the bounding ball, zigged left, zagged right and sprinted 82 yards for a touchdown to give Eastside a 27-24 victory.

"It was really a dumb play by our coaching staff," Hurricanes' coach Rick Swain said. "I take full blame. You don't kick off to one of the best open-field runners in the area. I was trying to call a timeout because we had called a squib left (where Woulard had lined up), but no one saw me. Our kicker did what we asked initially, but we wanted to change what we had set up.

"Obviously, we wouldn't have kicked it to him."

The play was a capper on what was a tremendous evening for Woulard, who completed 6 of 12 passes for 128 yards and three touchdowns (not including the

But he wasn't the only quarterback who performed brilliantly.

Gainesville's Kasey Ross completed 15 of 22 for 138 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran for 43 yards, despite battling leg cramps throughout the second half.

But Woulard, who was unavailable for comment after a postgame near-brawl saw players from each team sent to their respective buses, was the person who changed the contest and, perhaps, the complexion of the season for each team.

"It's a hard loss," Swain said. "We probably have a bigger rivalry with Eastside than any other team. Eastside was due, too. They've had some tough breaks this year and won on a night where I thought we managed the clock perfectly on our last drive and didn't give them time to do much.

"But give 'em credit. They came up with a big play."

Students learn culinary skills

The Institute of Culinary Arts is Alachua County School Board's school-tocareer program which prepares students for a career in the fast growing food service industry. Students are educated and trained in all aspects of the food service and hospitality industry. ICA has partnered with the Florida Restaurant Association in a school-to-work career ProStart program which promotes monitoring and allows students to earn advanced credit to further their education.

The program has flexibility of length depending on the needs and career goals of the student. Students completing 3 credits or more are eligible for the Florida Scholarship Program.

Students can attain advanced standing for competencies achieved in this program. Articulation agreements are currently in place at Johnson and Wales University, City College, and Bethune-Cookman College.

The Hungry Ram Cafe is a restaurant operated by the students in the Commercial Foods program at EHS. It is open to teachers, staff, and the public. Students operate the restaurant, bakery, and catering service in order to learn culinary procedures, techniques, and skills in food service.

Students have two hours a day of on-the-job training in a well-equipped commercial kitchen. This allows students hands-on training needed to work in a commercial kitchen. While operating the restaurant and catering service,

students travel through stations including sanitation and safety equipment, bakery, salads, grill work, and on the sauces and meats. Management training and business is introduced the second year to equip the student with management skills needed.

Second year students accomplish dining room operations skills by waiting on tables being host or hostess and cashier. Management training is emphasized.

The restaurant menu is determined by the curriculum and each week a different menu is offered.

Chef Billie DeNunzio, Director of Institute of Culinary Arts

If you think it's hard to cook spaghetti when you're camping, imagine cooking a three-course gourmet meal on a camp stove. In an hour. That is the feat perfected by a four-student team from the Institute of Culinary Arts magnet program at Eastside High School. The team recently won a silver award in gourmet meal preparation - second place in the nation - at the first national ProStart Culinary Team competition in Denver, Colo. Fortyfive teams, which came in first in their home states, participated in the event, which was sponsored by the National Restaurant Association's Educational Foundation. The Eastside team included senior Briton Dumas, senior Chris Blackwelder, senior Diana Redmon and junior Mike Hayes. Each student was awarded a \$9,000 cash college tuition scholarship. All plan to attend Johnson and Wales University in Miami. "I am so proud of these students," said Billie DeNunzio, founder and director of the magnet program, which prepares kids for careers in the hospitality industry.

DeNunzio's passion for the Institute of Culinary Arts program and the students she teaches continually pushes her to grow professionally. She recently completed a certification process through the American Culinary Federation. As an ACF-certified chef, DeNunzio can officially train other chefs. "It's like an accountant becoming a CPA," she explained. The certification required extensive, post-secondary teacher education, testing, certification in sanitation and nutrition, and the recommendations of other culinary

professionals. It took her five years to complete the process. "I wanted my students to realize how important those credentials are, and to set high goals for themselves. I can now start a junior chapter and start their exposure to the professional side of the industry even earlier." The International Baccalaureate Program

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Program, a demanding college preparatory curriculum, focuses on the classical liberal arts and sciences. Founded in the 1960's as a common university entrance credential to serve a consortium of international schools, the program is available today in over 1100 schools around the world.

Eastside's program, one of the first in Florida, graduated its first class of 21 IB Diploma students in 1987, and has now turned out nearly 1000 Diploma holders. In the year 2000 Eastside gave more IB

Examinations than any other school in North America. Over 600 students come from all over Alachua County to Eastside for the IB magnet program. Eastside's program is large and successful; it has served as a model for other schools in Florida and throughout the US. Newsweek magazine named Eastside as the third best high school in the US based on a ratio of per capita AP examinations.

Students who come to Eastside's IB Program actually begin with a Pre-IB in grades nine and ten. The formal IB Program serves juniors and

seniors. A typical IB student at Eastside completes four credits in Language A (English), four credits in Language B (French or Spanish), four or five credits in Individuals and Societies (social studies), four credits in Mathematics, and five credits in Experimental Sciences. The IB Sixth Subject (elective) asks that a student learn Studio Art, Music Performance, Theatre Arts, Psychology, or Physics. Many students choose to take more than one Sixth Subject. All IB students take a course in Theory of Knowledge, complete independent research leading to an original

essay of about 4000 words. and document 225 hours of Creative/Active/Service (CAS) work outside the classroom. For further information
